

### **Not from the Vicarage – but almost!**

What an amazing kaleidoscope of colour the church was for the Summer Festival of flowers! Everyone expressed delight at how wonderful it all looked – and how very effective the coloured ribbons looked behind the altar on the east wall – which we will keep up until after harvest. The ribbons were inspired by a line from the hymn Love Divine All Love's Excelling - 'Joy from heaven to earth come down' representing God's joy in creation and in Jesus, his Son. The 7 colours are the spectrum colours of light as God said 'Let there be light' (Gen 1) as the first act of creation. The rainbow shown to Noah reinforced God's newly refreshed creation and Jesus came to us as the Light of the world.

But did you know that 7 is the Biblical number signifying completeness and spiritual perfection? If you are interested in numbers here are some facts to think about - God brought his perfect creation to completeness in 7 days and 7's are everywhere in the New Testament: 7 sayings of Jesus from the cross; 7 signs in John; 7 parables in Matthew; 7 miracles on the Sabbath; 7 virtues; 7 gifts of the Holy Spirit; 7 'I am' sayings of Jesus; 7's are woven all the way through Revelation too e.g 7 churches and the 7 seals ..... but there are more to discover for yourselves including some in the Old Testament too.

And 7's are also significant in creation too: 7 notes in a musical scale; 7 crystal systems; 7 levels in the periodic table of elements ..... and human gestation is a multiple of 7 = 280 days ....

So to keep in the 7 mood, I have 7 bits of news!

1. Thanks to everyone for all the hard work put into the Flower Festival and Garden's Open. It was a great success on many levels not least the wonderful sum of £1200 profit.
2. Michael and I are hoping to move into the Vicarage during August. The refurbishments are going well and we are looking forward to welcoming you all for a house warming once we are settled in. We are very grateful for all the help from Tony with decorating and for all the plants that keep arriving for the garden.
3. We would like to plant a couple of trees in the front garden of the vicarage in memory of Martin Onions – maybe English natives like Hawthorn or Rowan. We are very mindful of Martin's contribution to parish life and it seems especially so when we are at the vicarage where he lived with his family. So if you would like to contribute to this memorial please can you give your donation to Sheila or Christine and we will arrange a planting ceremony in the autumn.

4. The Marylebone Ladies are visiting us again on August 6<sup>th</sup> and David is planning a great day for them again. If anyone has any good unwanted clothes or jewellery for a 'give away stall' or some toiletries I know the Ladies will enjoy having a rummage through!
5. St Peter's Quiet mornings in August and September will be focused into only 2 sessions. Wednesday August 19<sup>th</sup> will be a Quiet Day with Muriel Pargeter called 'Purify my Heart' from 10am to 2pm – bring your own packed lunch. September 16<sup>th</sup> will again be a Quiet Day with Muriel, theme will be "Delight yourself in the Lord—Psalm 37.
6. As part of the Jubilee celebrations we are planning to create a set of 5 long kneelers to furnish the altar rail at All Saints. Jean Hull has written about this in the magazine in more detail.
7. Bishop Mark will be coming to celebrate the 10am Eucharist with us on Sunday February 21<sup>st</sup> 2016 to mark the 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the consecration of All Saints as a church on 21<sup>st</sup> February 1956 – so this is a date for your diary when you get the new one for next year! More details will follow later in the year.

Furthermore, going the extra mile, he ferried them back to base in our garden at home.

### **Safeguarding**

At the first PCC Meeting after the APM our Child Protection and Vulnerable Adult Policies were agreed, signed and copies put on display in the Churches and Hall. Prior to this, in April, Beverley had reviewed all our Policies and Procedures and, where, necessary changes were made.

DBS checks recently have been renewed for some and we are welcoming three new Members to our Pastoral Team who have also been checked.

Just as I am about to finish the new Church of England "Practice Guidance: Safer Recruitment" arrived in my Inbox. It was published 24th.June with a review date May 2016 as I am sure you will appreciate this is an important Document which will need to be read carefully. Then we will need to make sure that all our Policies and Procedures are updated.

### **Child Protection**

No new Workshops are available at the moment but in September there is a "Link up Event for Youth Workers". It is aimed at Salaried Workers but all other Youth Workers are welcome. As it is mid-week only "people of leisure"!!!! will be able to attend.

### **Vulnerable Adults**

Church House is still in the process of arranging Vulnerable Workshops.

On Saturday 6<sup>th</sup>.June Beverley arranged a "Dementia Friends" Training to be given by Guild Care. As many of you will know we have been wanting to access this training for the Parish so we can be dementia aware as a congregation, help us support those who have dementia/memory loss and so we can understand the needs of their carers too. There was a good attendance and we can now call ourselves a "Dementia Friendly Church".

## St John the Baptist

Born to Zachariah and Elizabeth who was the cousin of the Blessed Virgin Mary. After his birth, nothing more is heard about John until he began preaching and baptising in the river Jordan around 27AD. He ate locusts and wild honey, his message was one of repentance and preparation for the coming of the messiah and his kingdom. Among his disciples were future apostles, Peter and Andrew. He baptised Jesus and recognised him as the messiah having seen the spirit come down upon him.

He denounced the incestuous union of Herod Antipas with Herodias and was imprisoned for doing so. His death was brought about by the hatred of Herodias and the weakness of Herod. He promised Salome whatever she liked, even half his kingdom. But after consultation with her mother, Salome demanded the head of John the Baptist. So without a trial an executioner was dispatched and John's head was presented to Salome.

He was believed to have been buried at Sebaste (Samaria) but the tomb was desecrated. Various relics have been claimed but none are likely to be authentic.

There are no fewer than 496 ancient churches dedicated in his honour, a total exceeded only by Mary, Peter, Michael, Andrew and All Saints.

Another of his patronages was the Knights Hospitallers whose work was to guard the Holy Sepulchre at Jerusalem and to protect pilgrims. Several of their round churches survive in England. The temple church in London and the church of St John the Baptist in Little Maplestead are examples.

In art, John is represented both as prophet and baptiser. He is dressed in skins and pointing to a lamb (Agnus Dei) lying on a book. He carries a long cross in the other hand.

His birthday is thought to be 24<sup>th</sup> June - 6 months before that of Jesus and his feast day is 29<sup>th</sup> August, the day of his death.

## **The All Saints A.R.K. Project**



## PRAYING TOGETHER in August

We come as sheep in one fold to follow you, good shepherd.  
We come as children in one family to praise you, loving Father.  
We come as citizens of one world to worship you, Creator God.  
And we give thanks that you hear our prayers,  
delight in our worship and surround us with your love.

**Amen.**

Forgive us, Lord, when we turn away from the cries of others  
and offer no rest to those who are weary.  
Help us when we turn others away from your fold  
and do not trust you to be our good shepherd.  
Forgive us, help us and heal us,  
that we, and all people, might know goodness and mercy  
and dwell in your house all our lives long.

**Amen.**

Let us for a moment think of our prayers as being like circles in a pond, made by throwing a stone into the water. The surface of the pond is still and silent; the stone drops into the middle, and we see the first circle emerge.

In this circle are the people closest to us - family, friends, the irreplaceable ones. There aren't many in the first, small circle, but we know them well, their strengths and their struggles, their enjoyments and their special needs. Let us pray for them now...

Circle us Lord. Circle our family and friends with the love of the gospel. Keep them in peace and security. Guard those of our loved ones who are vulnerable; strengthen those who are struggling; encourage those who are on the brink of something new. We have named those special people in our hearts or aloud.

May the deep peace of the Prince of Peace keep them all.

Circle them Lord. Keep love within; keep danger out.

The circle spreads. Look now at the second circle. Here are the people we know well, perhaps work with, go out with sometimes. Here there may be more distant members of the family whom we don't make contact with as much as we ought, but we care for them none the less. Here are neighbours, friends from a while ago, people who send us Christmas cards. And there are many needs; let us remember some, and pray for them.

Circle us Lord. Circle our nation with the values of the gospel.  
Give to our national institutions the values of justice, fair representation,  
concern for the weak, equal opportunities for every person.  
And may the sheer generosity of your presence infuse our national life  
with hope and encouragement.

Circle us Lord. Keep hope within; keep despair out.

The circle spreads again. Look now at the third and fourth circles. People we know less well. We see them at the school gate, every day we exchange a friendly word. We meet them in the shop, or out with the dog, or we greet them in the pub. There are hundreds of people out here in these circles, too many to pray for individually. In any case, we don't know their needs. But they are known to God; he has loved them from their birth.

Let them be washed by these circles of prayer.

Circle us Lord. Circle the sick and the bereaved in your healing presence. There are some we know who are simply not well; some who are fearful and in pain; some who are on their last journey. Circle them now Lord, the very people we name in our hearts or aloud, circle them in the healing presence of Christ.

May the touch of Christ be for them the touch of wholeness and healing.

Circle them Lord. Keep peace within; keep fear out.

The circles are right out. They reach the edge of the pond; one after another they lap against the banks. Our prayers extend to the ends of the earth, for all God's creation is the object of his mercy.

Our prayer is an act of love for the world. Let us delight to encompass all things within the circle of God's extraordinary care and keeping. In these far circles, hold everything in the love of the Father.

Circle us Lord. Our hearts, our homes, our church, our nation, our world.

Circle us and let us never slip outside the enchantment of your grace,  
for Jesus' sake.


Until Sunday 9th August. The Southern Ceramic Group- Summer Exhibition in the Bishop's Kitchen.




