“.....hear them read” Section 3 the Old Testament

Somebody asked who chooses the bits of Bible we read on Sundays and why. Every Sunday the notice sheet has the bible readings on the inside and we are offered at least 4 bits each time, nowadays in a 3 year cycle. Over the last two months I was thinking about the Gospel and the “Epistles”.

Now I turn to the OT readings, which are comparatively new for the C of E and were brought in as a regular thing in 1980 – the ASB. Nowadays we are offered 3 OT readings each Sunday. Apart from the Psalm, which I would like to think about another time, there is a choice of two schemes of OT readings each Sunday. The schemes are called 1 and 2 or more helpfully “Continuous” and “Related”. Continuous means the readings wander through the OT from beginning to end over the 3 year course. Related means they pick out a bit from the OT which links with the theme of the gospel for the day. Our Sunday sheet gives us the one from the Related lot, which is a great help, and we have to stick with that choice for the whole year so we always have 2 of the 3 readings which refer to the same theme of the day.

I always think anyone can read through the OT continuously if they want to, (though most people give up at Leviticus!) but on Sundays the OT choice ought to give us some help in understanding why the OT is in our Christian Bible at all. It’s worth noting that when the New Testament says “the scriptures” it means the Old Testament, which was after all Jesus’ Bible. There was no settled NT for at least 200 years after Christ. It just grew bit by bit, here and there, till they settled its contents for fear it should get out of hand.

The OT is a collection of different books and types of writing, some of which have got misplaced, or split up and put together in the wrong order, or edited and revised to fit in with changing political or religious fashions. It may help to think of the OT as a collection of paperbacks on a shelf; some of the bindings have come apart and put back together in the wrong order, some have ended up in the wrong place on the shelf, some have been rewritten and both versions are there side by side. So it’s a good thing to have help in picking out the bits that fit in with the Sunday theme.

All this happened a long time ago. It was the year 1967 and at that time I was employed as a Conveyancing Clerk at the Town Clerk's Office of Brighton Council.

In the early 1950's the Council embarked on a slum clearance programme which had been suspended by the War years. By 1967 we were nearly finished. The Head of the Conveyancing Team was a Mr. Berrett. He was not a Solicitor but was as near a Conveyancing expert as one can get. He was a wonderful old gentleman and I became his Assistant and I owe him a great debt. He introduced me to the Conveyancing world and by 1967 we had just about the last clearance to be made.

George Street Gardens was a line of small terraced cottages on the north side of Edward Street and not far on the west there now stands Brighton Police Station. The access to these cottages was via a pedestrian path and there was a small garden on the other side of the path. In one of the cottages lived Miss Sarah Prinsep. We always understood that she had been a Nursing Sister in a big London Hospital and I suppose she must have been about 70 years. When I became involved with her properly she was a tiny lady only about 5 feet 4 inches in height and you formed the impression that she was used to getting her own way.

One by one the Council acquired every one of these cottages except Miss Prinsep's. She absolutely refused the compensation determined by the Council's Valuer at £1,500 and insisted that she was entitled to much more. She made frequent visits to the Town Hall and I was always deputed to see her when she arrived. (Why was it always me who had to do jobs like this?) She would arrive at the public counter and the staff at the general office quickly realised she was there. She would raise her voice and bang on the counter and simply would not give in.

She wrote to the Council almost daily and we acquired four or five files of her letters and our replies. At one point she visited the House of Commons and waylaid the Minister of Housing who, I think, was Mr. Duncan Sandys but, of course, to no avail. I explained to her that, in addition to the purchase money, the Council were obliged to pay her Solicitor's and Surveyor's fees, the removal costs and all other incidental expenses involved in selling up. The Council's Housing Manager had kept quite near by a small brand new flat in a low rise block but she refused even to look at it.

The Council realised that something had to be done to bring this state of affairs to an end and the first step was to apply to the Lands Tribunal to determine the compensation payable. This they did and confirmed the Council's offer of £1,500. Miss Prinsep did not attend at the Hearing or appoint anyone to act on her behalf. She was duly notified of the Tribunal's decision and on her next visit I told her that it would need an Act of Parliament to increase the compensation. The Council were obliged to pay the compensation, she refused to accept, into the Bank of England and this could be paid on proof of an Applicant's title. The Council were entitled (under the Compulsory Purchase Acts) to acquire the legal ownership of the cottage and this I did by means of what was known as a Deed Poll.

At Weekends the halls can be hired together for the whole morning or afternoon or evening session for very reasonable rates starting from £75.00, please call or email for more information.

The fateful day approached when Miss Prinsep had to be removed from her home. The Housing Manager was receiving complaints about leaving a flat empty for so long and there was fear that one or more of the cottages would be targeted by vandals or squatters who would perhaps cause a flood or a fire. On the 13th December 1967 a team arrived at no: 18 and had the horrible job of evicting Miss Prinsep. The Police and Social Services were there with some other officials and she was removed to bed and breakfast accommodation. No: 18 was quickly boarded up and all the cottages were demolished soon after. One of the worst things about the 13th December was it is snowed and snowed and snowed.

Within a month Miss Prinsep was dead and we understood that a relative of hers in a short space of time had extracted the £1,500 compensation money from the Bank of England.

That was the end of a long and very unhappy story.

Every new resident is given a welcome pack which I includes basic food items, toiletries, cooking utensils, cutlery, plate, cup etc. and new towels. Soon it is hoped to transform the front garden with the volunteer gardeners.

We have had some wonderful gifts lately from a couple of people who have “downsized” and also donations from an employer who wishes, when he can, to contribute. I feel these generous gifts need a special “Thank you”. this month

I am very aware, while writing this, that “Together we can make a difference.”

Contemplative Prayer At All Saints

Last year we formed a Contemplative Prayer Group at All Saints, meeting for an hour in church on the third Sunday each month.

On the surface, contemplative prayer may appear difficult, or a little strange, but it isn't. It is well rooted in the Christian faith. When we meet we use writings of Julian of Norwich upon which to base a short meditation and then we sit quietly for 20 minutes. In contemplative prayer we seek to be aware of the presence of God and to remain attentively in that presence, completely open to God; waiting upon God; listening for God. When we come to God in silence and stillness we lay aside all else, making ourselves available, open and receptive for God to do as he wills. Perhaps the best description is prayer of the heart.

If you feel that you would like to give this form of shared silent prayer a try simply come along next time, or you if you just want to find out a little more speak to me after church or if you prefer give me a call one evening on 01903 241760. You don't need any knowledge of Julian or her writings, or any experience of contemplative prayer, to join us. All you need is a willingness to listen for and to meet God in the silence.

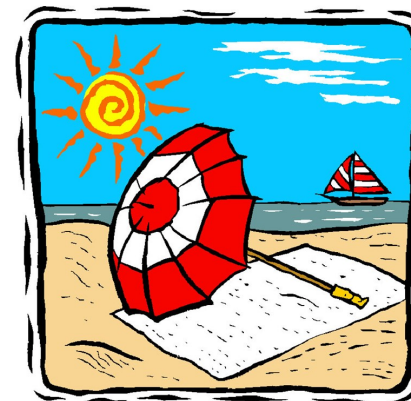
